10 Years of RATPOD

Not in our wildest dreams could we have predicted that the idea of a bike ride in the Dillon, Montana, area would turn into not only one of the most coveted events in the region, but also our single largest source of funding each year. But that's exactly what RATPOD has become — and we couldn't be happier! The funny-sounding name stands for Ride Around The Pioneers in One Day and that's what it is: a one-day 130-mile cycling tour in the Big Hole Valley of Southwest Montana.

The ride was the brainchild of Missoula physicians Phil Gardner and Eric Kress, joined by physical therapist John Fiore. After pitching the idea in 2000 and joining forces with Camp Mak-A-Dream, RATPOD was born and the first ride took place in June 2002 with 112 riders. The event grossed just over \$35,000 and a good time was had by all.

Now 10 years later, RATPOD has grossed more than \$1.7 million for Camp and now fills up to its rider cap (which this year is 650) in record time ... under 20 minutes last year!

There is a dedicated group of volunteers who contribute their time, talents and cycling expertise to making RATPOD the incredible event it's become. We want to express our most sincere appreciation for all they do for Camp.

Burt Kinyon Estate Gift

Last year, Camp Mak-A-Dream was one of three regional charities to each receive more than \$600,000 from the Estate of Burt and Etta Kinyon. Burt Kinyon was born in 1923 in Stillwater County, and his family moved to Bozeman in 1930. He went into the Air Force as an aircraft engine mechanic and was stationed in England during World War II. Burt moved to Butte in 1947 and two years later married Etta Singular, who worked the checkout at Buttrey's grocery. He worked at Wellman Motors and later as a mechanic for Butte-Silver Bow, before retiring in 1985. The couple was married for 49 years, until Etta's death in 1998. Burt Kinyon died March 6, 2010, at age 83. The couple worked hard, lived a frugal life and invested well. Family and long-time friends of the Kinyons who presented the check at Camp Mak-A-Dream last October said the couple were quiet people who liked the outdoors. Burt especially enjoyed wildlife photography. The Kinyons also loved children, but never had any of their own and wanted to leave their money to organizations benefiting children.

Caregivers Conference

President's Message

Dear Friends of Camp Mak-A-Dream:

Cancer is irrational. It will never show understanding, concern or sympathy for age, gender, education, race, money, religion, science, or friends and family. And even with all the medicines, treatments and therapies that cancer can challenge, it will never figure out how to lessen the experiences or dampen the hopes and the dreams created at Camp Mak-A-Dream.

Those affected by cancer face a number of challenges — be it living from treatment to treatment and exam to exam, the feeling of isolation or lack of social interaction, the inability to physically do the things one used to do and wishes to do again, or living with the fear of recurrence. It all adds up to living in sort of a "Medical Standard Time" that can make daily life a blur. In this time zone, it may feel like cancer controls the clock and it will do everything it can to steal your hopes and your dreams. However, at Camp Mak-A-Dream, we know that if we can change the time zone, we can perhaps have an impact on changing someone's outlook as well.

On 87 acres near Gold Creek, Montana, we allow those affected by cancer a week of normalcy, by allowing them to take their life back by removing them from Medical Standard Time. Once on "Montana Time," cancer does not stand a chance as our participants gain independence and confidence from discussions with their peers, attending educational workshops, hiking, swimming, fishing, rafting and most importantly, connecting with others who have faced similar challenges. Out of these Montana experiences our participants conquer cancer by regaining their time, their hopes and their dreams. For 16 years we have watched how one week of Montana Time can heal what traditional cancer treatments and hospital stays cannot.

On behalf of everyone at Camp Mak-A-Dream, thank you to all of our supporters for sharing your talents and resources so that we may extend time, grow hope and continue to dream big. With your continued support, we promise to continue to heat cancer one week at a time.

Founder's Profile

The life of Sylvia Granader By Jennifer Benton

Sylvia would never make a big deal over the amazing things she's done, experienced or accomplished in her now 90 years on this planet. But those of us at Camp who adore and admire her would like to share a few of them with our supporters who help keep the dream of Sylvia's late husband, Harry, our founder, alive and thriving here at Camp Mak-A-Dream.

Although the majority of the year Sylvia spends her time in her home state of Michigan, she still journeys to Gold Creek, Montana, every summer to spend time visiting with and teaching the art of weaving to the many campers from across the country who attend Camp each season.

Camp has come a long way since opening in 1995 and since that time has welcomed more than 5,000 participants from 49 states and six different countries.

Sylvia studied the fine arts at Cranbrook Academy, where she earned a Master of Fine Art degree with her focus on weaving — and she still puts that knowledge and passion to use in the Camp art barn each summer.

A true reflection of her outgoing nature and ability to do almost anything, Sylvia joined the U.S. military during World War II as a WASP pilot who transported aircraft from one location to another, freeing up male counterparts to serve in the war efforts in Europe.

With long-overdue recognition, Sylvia and her fellow WASPs were presented with the Congressional Gold Medal at the Capitol in Washington, D.C., last March. Then on Veterans Day 2010 at the Missoula Military Museum at Fort Missoula, these women were honored with a new display about the WASPs and their service to our country. Sylvia is featured front and center in this display, so if you're ever in the Missoula area, we encourage you to stop by and see it.

After her military service, Sylvia married the love of her life, Harry Granader, raised a family and became involved in the family business of being McDonald's franchise owners.

While Sylvia has many things to be proud of, I think she would say that one of the proudest was the arrival last spring of her first greatgrandchild, Harry. That same year Sylvia celebrated her 90th birthday.

On behalf of all of us at Camp Mak-A-Dream, we want to thank Sylvia for her continued love for this special place and for carrying on Harry's dream.

Dear Friends,

Camp Mak-A-Dream marked its 15th anniversary in 2010, and with it, we continued our tradition of adding cutting-edge programs for cancer patients. The inaugural Teen Heads Up Conference hosted 13- to 18-year-olds with brain tumors, mentored by young adult brain tumor survivors. During our blend of education and recreation, we hosted workshops on relationship building and overcoming physical and cognitive challenges. In addition, we partnered with Missoula nonprofits serving the homeless, at-risk children and the elderly, giving our campers the opportunity to understand and give to individuals with real yet different day-to-day challenges than the ones they face every day.

This coming year we will, for the first time in Camp Mak-A-Dream's history, introduce the opportunity for a cancer patient to share his or her experience with a loved one. In November, we will host approximately 10 young adults with their primary caregiver and provide our unique mix of fun and learning. It will provide the young adult the opportunity to form lifelong connections with other cancer patients, and at the same time allow caregivers the opportunity to share stories and challenges and to connect in a meaningful way that only a community experience allows. We are excited to pilot this program, as well as a revamped Young Adult Survivor Conference in January 2012 that will focus on practical and tangible skills of transition through the cancer continuum.

Our innovative community programs would not be possible without our supporters. Whether you are able to donate time, donate goods from our wish list, donate money, or just share the word about the magic that happens in Gold Creek, you are what has made a life-changing experience possible for more than 5,000 individuals affected by cancer. 
